
United States Flag Disposal

Community Information



The Lansdowne-Yeadon Elm Street Program celebrates its 1st anniversary in March 2012. The Lansdowne Economic Development Corpora-

tion (LEDC) administers this neighborhood revitalization strategy in partnership with the Boroughs of Lansdowne and Yeadon. Residents and stakeholders worked with the Community Action Agency of Delaware County to create the 2010 Lansdowne-Yeadon Elm Street Plan which details community projects in five focus areas: (1) Sustainable Organization; (2) Safe, Clean & Green; (3) Design; (4) Image & Identity; (5) Neighbors & Economy.

During our first year, LEDC worked with both Boroughs to nominate and appoint seven (7) members to our Neighborhood Advisory Committee (NAC). The NAC provides a forum for neighborhood residents, Council representatives, and LEDC to discuss planned projects and address community needs. In response to resident concerns about flooding along Union Avenue, the NAC and LEDC will present a Do-It-Yourself Stormwater Management series for homeowners focused on rain garden design.

Last summer, LEDC installed seven (7) rain barrels for homeowners in our neighborhood which hold rain water for later use. Rain gardens operate similarly; however, they are natural landscape features of native plants with the ability to hold and absorb more rain water than a 60-gallon barrel. This means rain gardens and rain barrels work even better together. On Thursday, May 3rd at 7 PM, LEDC and the Pennsylvania Environmental Council (PEC) will lead a public rain garden design workshop in the Bany Community Room of the Lansdowne Public Library, located at 55 South Lansdowne Avenue. Homeowners will learn how to choose a site for a rain garden and select appropriate plants, as well as learn how to install and maintain a rain garden.



In partnership with the Lansdowne Public Library, we hold monthly Fill Out Forms Day events to connect members of our community with social services, such as food stamps,

weatherization, Medicare, and utility assistance, as well as answer questions about applications for student financial aid and employment programs. On the second Monday of each month, from 11 AM to 2 PM, we hold confidential consultations in the Bany Community Room of the Lansdowne Public Library.

All residents can participate in these events.

We Are Growing! Care to
Join us?



The Lansdowne Human Relations Commission is working to expand its membership from five commissioners to seven. Our Commission is a proactive one; we work to prevent and, if required, resolve unlawful discrimination in the Borough. The reason for this expansion is both to provide additional educational and prevention programs and also to ensure that we are reflective of the rich diversity that is Lansdowne and the hallmark of our mission.

We are currently seeking two persons of color with a strong commitment to civil rights to join us in our work. Typically members devote about three hours a month to the Commission. Candidates should be able to attend our once a-month evening Commission meetings, assist in the development and implementation of educational activities in the Borough (such as helping us table at community events), and participate in other forms of outreach. Commission members also respond to citizens' complaints of unlawful discrimination and participate, if needed, in resolution of complaints. We are glad to report that such complaints are quite rare, but they are always followed up fully and diligently.

If this sounds like the kind of citizen involvement you would enjoy, please contact us through our web site (see below) to learn more about the Commission and the role of our commissioners. And in case, these two positions have been filled when you read this, we will keep your information at hand and contact you when a vacancy occurs. We would love to explore your interest.

The Lansdowne Human Relations Commission would also like to take this opportunity to remind all residents and employees in the Borough that you are protected from unlawful discrimination in Lansdowne. In fact, our community offers more protection than most municipalities in the Commonwealth.

Do you know your rights and responsibilities? Please read through the list of protected classes so you will be familiar with ordinance 1215, which established the Commission to educate, investigate, mediate, and resolve any complaints of unlawful discrimination. We are also available to speak to community groups and religious congregations and can tailor presentations to suit your organization.

Discrimination on the basis of race, color, gender, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity and expression, familial status, age, veteran status, mental or physical disability, pregnancy, use of guide or support animals or aids for those with blindness, deafness or other physical disability is against the law in Lansdowne.

Critter Corner

Dial 911...please!

The only protocol to summon emergency help for animal issues in Lansdowne is to call 911. While many of us are reluctant to dial that number in anything but a dire emergency, this is exactly what our police department advises us to do.

You always have the option to tell the 911 dispatcher that this is not a true emergency, but making this call is how we start the wheels in motion when we need to reach our police for help, including with animal situations.

"We need to remind Lansdowne residents that calling 911 is the only approved way to summon assistance for animal emergencies in our community," warns Chief Dan Kortan of the Lansdowne Police Department. "We have a contract with Delaware County Animal Control, who are on-call 24/7 to handle these situations," he added, "and the best way to get a timely response is to have the police department respond and call them on your behalf." An officer may come out to investigate first, then call for assistance from Animal Control as appropriate. A sick, injured or threatening animal outside, or a wild animal that has made its way indoors are the types of situations that would indicate such a call.

Animal Friends of Lansdowne (AFL) may be able to assist with other situations, such as a companion animal who is lost or found, stray and feral companion animals. Please remember that we are an all-volunteer organization with no office and we will return phone and email messages at the earliest opportunity. While residents may contact us at any time with their concerns, urgent

and wild animal situations always require a call to our police via 911.

How to Deal with a Missing Pet

AFL occasionally receives calls and emails from residents whose pets are lost. Here is our best advice to deal with this stressful scenario:

Microchip your pet.

If your pet is taken to a shelter, rescue, vet, or animal control facility, they will first be scanned to see if they are owned and lost. This is the best way to ensure their safe return. And please be sure you keep your contact information up-to-date with the chipping agency who maintains it. If you move or change your phone number, you will need to notify them.

Be sure to take and keep clear photographs of your pet. Use one to create a flyer to distribute around the neighborhood and beyond. Post flyers with your pet's name, photo, personality, description, and any medical issues around the neighborhood, including in your neighbors' doors. Emailing flyers to area rescues and shelters, animal control, and local police is also very important. You may also post on our Animal Friends of Lansdowne Facebook page.

Call police, animal control and local shelters to notify them that your pet is missing. Ask neighbors for help. Provide a full description, when they were last seen, and where. Do this immediately. Enlist neighbors to help form a search party and walk the neighborhood calling your pet by name. This often works before your pet can get very far away.

Contact Chester County SPCA Since Delaware County SPCA has stopped taking animals from animal control, Chester County has kindly stepped in to assist temporarily by taking them in. Until our new county shelter is built and available, it is essential that you also contact Chester County in case your pet may have been taken there.

Important Information from Borough Staff

Let's "Pick it Up" for Safer Recreation and Cleaner Water

Pet waste is a source of many harmful microorganisms that can be transmitted from the waste to humans if it is not promptly picked up and disposed of. This list includes *E. coli*, *Giardia*, *Cryptosporidium*, *Salmonella*, *Campylobacter*, Brucellosis, and roundworm parasites. Many of these microorganisms will last months in the soil, and some up to four years, if not immediately cleaned up from lawns, along trails, in parks or preserves. Studies have shown that dog waste is also a significant source of bacterial and nutrient contamination to streams, especially during the "first flush" from a rain storm which carries the majority of the pollution washing off of lawns and hard surfaces.

To protect your family and to be considerate of your fellow residents and other trail users, please remember to "scoop the poop" with a plastic bag and dispose of it promptly in a public trash can or your own trash receptacle (not your neighbor's trash can or down storm drains, please). Composting or burying your pet's waste does not destroy harmful organisms.

- Don't forget to lock unattended vehicles. More often than not, theft from vehicles involves unlocked cars. Don't make theft easy.
- Call 911 for police response. This is not just an emergency number it is the number for police response. If you need an officer for any reason, a crime, or a suspicious situation call. Lansdowne's Police Officers can't be everywhere at once so they count on the cooperation and support residents provide. News From the Borough Manager

During the next 12-18 months Lansdowne will be working with experts in the field of pedestrian planning and urban design to take the next step in its long-term vision for the revitalization of the downtown core. This month the Borough begins a new project that will generate a plan for reshaping the pedestrian patterns and pathways and to improve the links between the pedestrian, transportation, and retail activity. The plan will cover a wide range of tasks including interactive public participation sessions, detailed designs schematics, and securing of access rights for new pathways.

All of this is possible because The Delaware Valley Regional Planning Commission ("DVRPC") accepted applications for a grant program known as the Transportation and Community Development Initiative ("TCDI"). The intention of the grant program is to seed and support redevelopment efforts in the Philadelphia region's core and its older suburbs as a catalyst to reverse trends of disinvestment and decline. Lansdowne Borough filed and was one of only a handful of awardees. The amount awarded to Lansdowne for this work was \$30,700.

Stay tuned for more information about this project in the coming months.


It's time for spring cleaning!





Every town deserves a library that provides vital programs with resources to meet the needs of its residents. The Lansdowne Library strives to do exactly that! However, because the State of Pennsylvania reduced the library system funds by 30%, we are faced with new challenges that have to be met if we want the Lansdowne Library to achieve its objectives. The Friends of the Lansdowne Library and the Library Board are seeking your support at this time of need. We are asking you to join us by becoming a member of the FLPL and thereby helping us meet the many challenges that our library faces.

As many of you know, the Lansdowne Library is an important community center for education, technology access and recreation. Every day the Lansdowne Library is filled with school age children seeking homework help. Then there are individuals who have different and special needs. Some are seeking jobs on-line as others do their college research papers. And there are those who are simply looking for a good book, periodical or DVD. Then most important are our smallest children, who are so very eager to learn...and who are enchanted by our famous Summer Reading Programs!

In 2011, The Friends of the Lansdowne Library were able to do the following:

- Supported after school programs which included the purchase of X-Box and Kinect
- Purchased a flat screen TV and Home Theater for movie nights and other library needs
- Equipped the library with Wii to encourage activities for all generations to enjoy
- Enabled 500 children to read over 2,000 books through our Summer Reading Program
